ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MISSION
SAINT THOMAS OF CANTERBURY EPISCOPAL CHURCH
TEMECULA, CALIFORNIA
Sunday, January 28, 2018

CALLED TO ORDER

The 2018 Annual Meeting of the Mission of Saint Thomas of Canterbury Episcopal Church, Temecula, California, was called to order in Julian of Norwich Hall on the above date at 11:37 AM.

INVOCATION

The Reverend Timothy True, Vicar, opened the meeting with a prayer.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE 2016 ANNUAL MEETING

Peter Mandery called for a motion to approve the minutes of the 2017 Annual Meeting. A motion was made by Jack Bundy and seconded by Phil Mihok to approve the minutes; the motion carried.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT

Peter Mandery, Senior Warden, received nominations for three candidates to serve on the Bishop's Committee: Virginia Patton, Tom Reid, and Frank Rojas, each to serve a three year term. There was a call for nominees to the Bishop's Committee from the floor; no new nominees came forward.

Fr. Tim passed out a sheet of biographies for nominees for the Bishop's Committee and for delegates to the 2018 Diocesan Convention. The delegates to the 2018 Diocesan Convention will also vote on the next Bishop of the San Diego Diocese.

Fr. Tim announced that the Senior Warden and Junior Warden will automatically be delegates to the 2018 Diocesan Convention from St. Thomas of Canterbury. For the remaining delegate, the following four members of the congregation were nominated: Tess Crawford, Bill Liesman, Jenny Shreve, and Holly True. There was a call for nominees to serve as delegates to the 2018 Diocesan Convention; no new nominees came forward.

Phil Mihok moved to close nominations; Ed Rather seconded the motion; the motion carried.

ELECTION

Pat Grannan moved to approve the slate of nominees for the Bishop's Committee and to elect the three candidates for the three positions by acclamation; John Crawford seconded the motion; the motion carried. Members running for the Bishop's committee were introduced. By acclamation vote, the three new Bishop's Committee members serving three year terms are: Virginia Patton, Tom Reid, and Frank Rojas.

The four candidates for delegates to the 2018 Diocesan Convention were introduced. Voting took place by writing the name of the one candidate of choice on a piece of paper.

LUNCH

Fr. Tim offered grace before lunch. Members of the congregation enjoyed a potluck luncheon, organized by W.O.W. (Women of Worth).

RECOGNITION OF GOD'S SERVANTS

Fr. Tim first recognized the St. Thomas of Canterbury School for their service. He introduced Darlene Karnes-Versteegh, school director, who, in turn, introduced the staff of the school. Cary "Klip" Klippert, liaison to the school, added that the school, while being first and foremost a ministry, also contributes \$9,000/month toward the church mortgage payment. He complimented Darlene on the increase in enrollment since her arrival two and a half years ago, which is now up to 80+ from the 40+ students when she started.

Fr. Tim honored Barbara Bundy and Judy Pellam for their service to St. Thomas. Barbara served as volunteer administrative assistant to the Vicar for the past three years and also served as the clerk of the Bishop's Committee for the past three years; Judy served as an office volunteer, office volunteer coordinator, and ministry coordinator for many years. Both were presented with flowers and cards of thanks from the Bishop's Committee and the congregation.

Fr. Tim recognized all the members of the Bishop's Committee, those continuing, those who are newly elected, and those who are outgoing. Fr. Tim presented outgoing Bishop's Committee members, Jack Bundy, Irene Eisenhut, and Virginia Patton (who is both outgoing for completing a one year team and newly elected for a new three-year term) with pins. Fr. Tim recognized and thanked Peter Mandery for his five years of service as Senior Warden. The congregation responded with a standing ovation of appreciation for Peter's dedicated service. He was presented with a plant and cards of thanks from the Bishop's Committee and the congregation.

Jack Bundy, Bishop's Committee member for Fellowship and Hospitality, thanked Judy Pellam and Peter & Deniece Mandery for their years of service to the Coffee Team as they now step down. Jack presented each with a small gift of appreciation.

PRESENTATIONS AND REPORTS

Election Results – Fr. Tim

Fr. Tim announced the results of the election of the delegated to the 2018 Diocesan Convention: Holly True was elected to be the delegate to the 2018 Diocesan Convention; alternates, in order, are: Bill Liesman, Tess Crawford, and Jenny Shreve.

Financial Report – Brian Hopley, Business Manager and Lynn Dordahl, Treasurer
Brian Hopley presented the 2017 financial statements for the church and school.

STATE OF THE MISSION

Fr. Tim gave an overview of the last six months, since his arrival on August 1, 2017. The goal of his first several months at St. Thomas was to establish and build relationships. He reviewed the parish statistics from 2017 that were included in his written report. In addition to administration, Fr. Tim will be working with the Bishop's Committee in two more areas:

1. Facilities:
The facility issues of erosion in the back of the church property and resurfacing the parking lot are being addressed. We have a grant to help with the erosion and we are currently accepting bids to resurface the parking lot.
2. The mission of the mission (ministry):

Together with the Bishop's Committee, Fr. Tim will be looking at how we can better proclaim the Good News of Christ.

In five years, the hope would be to achieve parish status.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

Peter expressed his gratitude for being able to serve as the Senior Warden for St. Thomas of Canterbury. He is proud to have served for Fr. Tim, welcomed him, and wished him Godspeed.

VICAR

The Reverend Timothy True

In my report this year I want to begin with a piece of financial transparency. St. Thomas is in a considerable amount of debt. Presently the Episcopal Diocese of San Diego is holding our promissory note (think mortgage) in the amount of approximately \$1.8 million. We are repaying it back at 5% interest. Without going into detail, what this means is that we paid down principal on the note by about \$30,000 in 2018. We're poised to do the same in 2019. Additionally, we have a "backburner" loan with the diocese of approximately \$900,000—*backburner* because we presently pay no interest on it but still owe (and will likely start paying interest once our promissory note is paid). Long story short, we're managing; but at our present tack it will take about 75 years to pay off our total debt.

It didn't take long after my arrival at St. Thomas to sense a feeling of anxiety here. This is understandable, isn't it? We are in a large amount of debt. The mainline church has been declining in membership and pledges steadily over the past four decades. Closer to home, the Episcopal Diocese of San Diego has had to make the difficult decision to sell several church properties over the last dozen years or so. So, what will happen to us if we can't keep up?

Anxiety isn't always a bad thing, though. I applaud the creativity I've seen since arriving here, especially with respect to space sharing (for a fee, of course). Our parking lot is a "Park and Ride" area. Cadenza Music Academy uses our nave for rehearsals on Wednesday night. We recently hosted a diocesan Walkabout event. Anxiety has motivated us to think in creative ways about how best to steward the property that houses our spiritual community.

Perhaps best of all, the diocese is motivated in this way too. There is keen interest on the diocese's part to partner with us in order to help us achieve the sustainability we so desire—maybe through developing the vacant part of our land, through rethinking our promissory note's terms, through a combination of these, or through some other means. Stay tuned in 2019 as these ideas begin to take form.

Indeed, we are moving forward with respect to our financial situation, taking action. Now, though a level of anxiety remains, what I sense is a stronger feeling of hope and vision. We are making great strides towards becoming a full-fledged parish.

But, of course, the church is not just about making ends meet. It's more—much more—about making disciples; about rallying together as a praying community to accomplish the mission Christ has left us, to proclaim good news to the world around us and heal and care for the sick and provide hope and advocacy for the marginalized and. . . .

The Bishop's Committee and I did a lot of hard work in 2018 around ideas. We studied a book together that examines the most important elements of church life and devoted time during each of our meetings to hash out these ideas in conversation. This year I will work with the Bishop's Committee to glean from the best of these mission-focused ideas and begin to put them into practice.

Exciting things are happening around here. Again, stay tuned in 2019!

Finally, then, the 2018 stats:

- Eucharist celebrated 238 times: 149 on Saturday nights or Sundays; 46 on weekdays; and 43 in homes and hospitals. 6,459 total persons received.
- Average Sunday attendance (ASA): 115.
- Daily Office services: 12.
- Baptisms: 1.
- Confirmations: 5.
- Reaffirmations: 1.
- Weddings: 1.
- Burials: 1.
- Pledging (as of 1/15/2019): \$163,014 (\$167,672 last year).

Dear Saint Thomas of Canterbury Family:

As we begin a new year, it's a good time for reflection. On a personal note, I am wrapping up my term on your Bishop's Committee. My journey of service at Saint Thomas began when I volunteered to be a Greeter, represented our church as a Delegate for the annual Diocesan convention, and then ultimately served on the Bishop's Committee. These past three years I have been responsible for the Evangelism portfolio, served as Junior Warden, and finally, as Senior Warden. I provide that history to encourage any of you who may have an interest in volunteering at Saint Thomas (in any capacity), to challenge yourself and not set limits on what you can accomplish. We concluded this pledge drive with 84 pledges, which is an increase from the prior year, and is approximately 91% of our goal! I am grateful to all those who value this church community and faithfully support our ongoing efforts to be the church that God intends us to be.

Last year was Father Tim's first full year as our Vicar. Part of his vision was to rearrange the responsibilities of the Bishop's Committee into three distinct commissions, which include: 1) Administration, 2) Property and Facilities, and 3) Ministry. Incorporated within each commission were individual Bishop's Committee portfolios. For 2018 I was chairperson of the Administration Commission and worked closely alongside Bishop's Committee members Patrick Grannan (Human Resources) and Frank Rojas (School Liaison). My areas of focus were Administration, Finance and general activities.

I am very encouraged about our future together at Saint Thomas. Our Church community has weathered many changes over the last five years, and we have proven time again that we are a resilient group! Our deep affection for each other, built upon our shared strong faith is a wonderful testament which allows us to continually strive to make a positive impact in the Temecula Valley.

Looking forward, Father Tim and your Bishop's Committee will be focused on ways to build upon what is working effectively, as well as trying new ideas and concepts to help ensure Saint Thomas is prepared for the future. I greatly appreciate all those individuals who have served before us and for the sacrifices they have made, as well as everyone today who makes Saint Thomas such a special place. Just as our faith is a journey, the life of our Church and its body (all of us), is a journey as well and it continually needs good stewards.

Thank you for granting me the privilege of serving.

It has been my pleasure to serve my second year on the Bishop's Committee in charge of Pastoral Care. After completing 50 hours of training, three Stephen Ministers (Lani-Karyn Jones, Elena Gimpel, and Suzie Grindle) were commissioned by Bishop Katharine.

In the fall, informational meetings were held after both Sunday services and a special presentation was provided for W.O.W. We have received one application to date and several members of indicated an interest. JoAnne Dreyfus and I, as Stephen Leaders, look forward to training more Stephen Ministers at St. Thomas but must have a minimum of four to begin instruction. Hopefully we will start a class later in the spring.

We continue to meet from 9-12 on Wednesdays for supervision and continuing education. Andrea Liesman provided an excellent presentation on the "ins-outs" of Medicare. We look forward to an informational tour at Temecula Valley Hospital in the Spring of 2019 and a visit from Hospice Care of the Valley. Providing this caring, interfaith ministry to our church members is of great importance to us. Everyone faces periods of crisis, transition, and personal difficulties in life. During these times, a caring relationship with someone who will faithfully listen, empathize, pray with and for them, and encourage them with Christ's love and care is of great benefit. To become the church Jesus calls us to be and to follow his command to "love one another as I have loved you" (John 13:34) we need to recognize and then meet the needs of our congregation and community. While Father Tim is always "on the front lines of this care," it is impossible to provide care to all those who need it. By equipping a team of members to provide high level of Christian care, pastoral care becomes more effective. A Stephen Minister walks alongside a person in the midst of a crisis, meeting with the person regularly---to listen, to care, to pray, and to encourage---for as long as reasonably needed. In Galatians 6:2, Paul writes "Bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the laws of Christ."

Stephen Ministry also offers a welcome family room for funerals/memorial services providing coffee, tea, water and light snacks as well as spiritual care if needed.



This year Prayers and Squares, Chapter 46, has had the most quilt requests ever with 32 people receiving our beautiful prayer quilts. We are an interfaith ministry that combines the gift of a hand-tied quilt with the gift of prayer for someone in need. We have received many moving “thank you” notes as well as pictures of recipients with their quilts. Our quilters include Virginia Patton, JoAnne Dreyfus, Anne Dipardo and myself. We occasionally enjoy “drop-ins” from Letty Rojas and others as their time allows. You can find us in the St. Scholastica Room/Teachers Lounge Friday Morning from 9-12...sometimes we spill over into the Narthex for more room.

I am so grateful to be involved in both these ministries and look forward to my third and final year on the Bishop’s Committee.

ST. THOMAS OF CANTERBURY EPISCOPAL SCHOOL

St. Thomas Episcopal School continues to serve 61 families with a total current enrollment of 73 children. The school provides a welcoming, nurturing, faith environment for children and their families who live in and around Temecula. Our academic curriculum provides a strong foundation for the current and future success of our children. We work closely to provide spiritual, social, academic, emotional and physical growth for all children in our care. We work with families to provide services, coordinate with outside agencies to provide support, and provide information for families who desire to learn more about our church.

KINDERGARTEN - Our kindergarten class, the Amazing Asteroids closed in August 2017. There was not enough parent interest to keep it open despite our marketing efforts. Parents are very happy with the Temecula Valley public schools and do not want to pay for private kindergarten.

PRE-KINDERGARTEN - Our pre-kindergarten class, the Super Stars, is taught by Mrs. Laura Wood, Miss Kayla Rees and our former kindergarten teacher, Mrs. Cynthia Hogan. Our teachers respond joyfully to the needs of our children. Mrs. Wood has more than 30 years experience in early childhood education, Miss Kayla has four years experience and is new to our school, and Mrs. Hogan has more than 20 years experience working with preschoolers and kindergarten age children. These teachers bring a wealth of knowledge to our 4 and 5 year old children. The time spent in class is divided between large groups, small groups, individual instruction and child initiated activities. The academic areas of writing, pre-reading, math, language, art, music, science and religion give our children a well-rounded education that will prepare them for kindergarten.

PRESCHOOL - Our preschool class, the Busy Bees, is taught by Mrs. Kristine Paplanus, (Mrs. P) Mrs. Carolann Gentile (Mrs. G), Mrs. Clara Escalante and Mrs. Linda Ray. Their “swarm” of energetic children keeps them busy each day. Mrs. Paplanus has over 14 years experience working with young children. Mrs. G has been teaching for over 25 years. Mrs. Ray has 12 years of teaching experience. Clara has been teaching for 20 years and is new to our school. Busy Bee children have the opportunity to explore and participate in small group activities such as art, sensory science, and math. These activities help prepare children to use invented spelling and left to right progression, which will lead to writing when they enter pre-k. Children are gathered each day for circle time where they learn about the weather, develop concepts like shape, color and color recognition, count by rote, choose helpers, learn songs, and listen to bible stories. There is time for child initiated activities that will enrich social skills, lengthen attention spans and build on their cognitive skills. This year our Busy Bee Class is very busy with 23 children. 5 children have some special needs, 3 children need help with maturity and one child who is learning English. A few children are working on becoming completely potty trained....Yes this is a busy room.

TODDLERS - Our toddler option class, the Little Ladybugs is taught by Mrs. Chantel Blas and Mrs. Kim Pargo, and Miss Kayla Rees. Chantel has been teaching children for 13 years and Kim has been teaching for more than 20 years. Chantel and Kim are new to our school. In this class, children, ages 18 months to young 2's are introduced to the wonderful world of preschool. Children begin to understand the structured environment of a classroom and the class schedule. Circle time is a group gathering activity used to share ideas, practice listening skills and enrich children's language and social skills. Small group time helps children express their creative thoughts through art and sensory. Other small group

activities include science and math activities. There is also time for child initiated activities such as dramatic play, block building, and using simple puzzles and manipulatives that encourage small motor development.

Toddler (2) class- the Friendly Fireflies-ages 2yrs-young three, is now in our former kindergarten class. This class opened on December 4, 2017. The teachers in this room are Mrs. Kristin Consedine and Mrs. Natesha Ellis. Kristin has more than 12 years experience working with young children here at St. Thomas. Natesha is beginning her second year with us. She is learning to teach and guide our young children. The children in this class are ready for more structure than the children in the Little Ladybug classroom. The Friendly Fireflies are becoming familiar with the school routine and classroom schedule. Children participate in circle time, small and large group activities as well as child initiated activities. Our focus is language development, faith development and beginning academics which include art, math, science, sensory activities.

CHAPEL - All children who attend school on Wednesdays or Thursdays walk with their Teachers to the church for chapel. The School Director, Darlene Versteegh, leads the children in “Jesus songs”, teaches the children church tradition, and reads a story from the bible. She uses props and visual aids to make the stories come to life. Chapel is a wonderful introduction to the wonders of God the father, the forgiveness of Jesus, and the divine grace of the Holy Spirit. We continue our ministry of care and concern for our children and families to incorporate prayer for people we know who need help or who are sick. There is a prayer jar on the welcome table for parents and parishioners to use. At the end of chapel, we pray for the people whose names are on the slips of paper in the jar.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH - Our school continues to act as a viable member of the Temecula community. We hosted our annual Thanksgiving Feast on November 15th, where our children invited their parents, grandparents, and friends. Parents brought food and drinks and the children recited their memory verse. Our annual Christmas program began in the sanctuary on December 20 and was very well attended. The children sang, helped tell the story of the angel visiting Mary, and recited their memory verse. There was a reception in the hall after the program.

MISSION AND MINISTRY FOR 2019 - As we continue to grow and enroll more children in our program, the school director is working on creating a bridge between the church and school. The school staff has been invited to participate in the monthly Dinners All Around church gathering. As part of our mission, we believe it is important for the parishioners to better understand our ministry. Other ministry opportunities include, the annual car show with a kid zone, ministry of the month showcasing the school, and possible on-site art show, and other community events. We are “The Little School with the Big Heart” and we are here to proclaim the word of God and spread the “Good News”. Blessings to you all.

Uses are higher by \$ 11,134 compared to 2017. The increase in uses is due mainly to increased personnel costs of (\$ 26,575). Having a Vicar for the full year (\$ 12,247) and the new position of admin assistant to the Vicar (\$ 9,492).

Expenses are higher than the previous year by \$ 103,508. Personnel is \$ 91,812 higher due to more teachers being employed. Occupancy is \$ 8,109 higher. In 2017 a one month exemption of the payment \$ 9,000 was granted by the diocese when they paid off the mortgage and restructured our debt as a promissory note to them.
