

Dear People of St. Thomas,

One of our successful outreach programs is feeding our friends, who need a meal, at the Temecula Food Pantry. The mission of The Order of the Daughters of the King is the extension of Christ's Kingdom through Prayer, Service and Evangelism.

Daughters of the King are women and girls between the ages of seven and one hundred and seven who desire a closer walk with the Lord. They are Christian women, both ordained and lay, who are strengthened through the discipline of a Rule of Life, and supported through the companionship of their sisters.



The Motto of the Order

For His Sake...
 I am but one, but I am one.
 I cannot do everything,
 but I can do something.
 What I can do, I ought to do.
 What I ought to do,
 by the grace of God I will do.
 Lord, what will you have me do?

DOK is a Christian order of women who agree to live under a Rule of Life. A rule of life is a self-imposed spiritual discipline practiced daily by an individual. It includes regular and seasonal devotions, both private and public, and is a commitment intelligently and prayerfully considered. A rule of life sets apart an order from other church organizations. To become a member of the DOK each woman undertakes a three-month period of study and discernment. Finally, each new member takes vows to uphold the two Rules of the Order, the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service.

The Rule of Prayer

In our Rule of Life, Prayer always comes first. It is the first priority for Daughters, and our Service and Evangelism depend upon it. Each Daughter's Rule of Prayer should be carefully considered and guarded. It should be prayerfully chosen, reviewed regularly and revised periodically. Our vows do not specify particular prayers, length of prayers, or times of prayer, just that we pray daily for our sisters, our church, and our clergy.

The Rule of Service

Through her Rule of Service, a Daughter daily seeks to do the will of God where she is, remembering Jesus' words, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these...you did it for me." Matthew 25:40. The Rule of Service is the application and extension of our baptismal vows. Each Daughter promises:

- To be Christ's faithful servant in the extension of His Kingdom.
- To regularly take part in the worship, study and work of the Church.
- To render at all times aid to the clergy as deemed necessary for the spiritual up-building of the parish.




The DOK Cross

At The Service of Admission, a new Daughter receives the cross of the Order as a mark of her membership. It is a modified Greek Fleury cross, inscribed in Latin, "Magnanimiter Crucem Sustine," meaning, "With heart, mind and spirit uphold and bear the cross." At the base of the cross are the letters "F)(S", initials that stand for the Motto of the Order: "For His Sake."

Health Update

SKIN CANCER CHECK

I hope everyone had their blood pressure checked on our recent health day for BP and Skin exam. Next time we may have people take a number so that the wait does not get out of hand. I want to thank Dr. Ricardo Vega and his wife Beth, who is an RN, for their assistance, and I also thank my Boss, Kay, also an RN, for her aid. I saw approximately fifteen "new Patients" in an hour and a half (sorry I couldn't see everyone) and would like to list some of the things I was asked about.



1) Angiomas, or cherry angiomas, were common. These can vary in size, do get irritated but mostly are just an annoyance and left alone, unless they bleed. Some patients can have hundreds but most have only a few. They have also been called "blood" moles.

2) Almost everyone asked about small white or small flat dark spots. Sun damage is the major factor here, unless there has been an injury such as a burn, cut, etc. The skin can either lighten or darken after it has been damaged and there is not much to do about this; it is called post inflammatory hypo- or hyper- pigmentation. These are quite different from the flat brown areas known as Lentigos, which come with maturing (aging) of the skin. These can be the simplex variety or the sun induced solar type.

3) We saw numerous nevi (moles), seborrheic keratoses (like warty moles), and skin tags and papillomas. These are usually ok unless they change. ITCHING is often the first symptom, and I want to emphasize this again. An *itchy lesion* may be heading toward malignancy, particularly in moles.

4) We also saw several with Solar Actinic Keratoses, which are precancerous and should be treated. I may have actually seen two or three skin cancers with a biopsy being necessary for these. Don't neglect this...*you know who you are*. Bleeding is an early sign and is always important in the history. Of course, the dark moles also deserve attention and follow-up. Never, never ignore changes in moles or other skin growths!

Sunscreens are discussed all the time, but we don't use them enough. Sun safety if you work outside is an employee health issue. Putting it on in advance is proper. Find one you like, or at least one you will use. If you use an insect repellent, the sunscreen should go on first and then the insect repellent.

CANTERBURY TRAILS HIKERS

Top 10 Longest Trails in the U.S.

1. **American Discovery Trail** (approximately 6,800 miles) – Stretches from coast-to-coast and splits in Ohio and Colorado for northern or southern routes.
2. **Great Western Loop** (6,800 miles) – Only one hiker has completed this trail, travelling 208 consecutive days averaging 33 miles per day!
3. **Eastern Continental Trail** (5,400 miles) – This trail connects multiple trail systems from Key West Florida to the Appalachian Trail and up into Canada.
4. **North Country National Scenic Trail** (4,600 miles) – Trail stretches from New York to North Dakota.
5. **Great Western Trail** (4,455 miles) – Trail passes through Arizona, Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, and Montana.
6. **Continental Divide National Scenic Trail** (3,100 miles) – Starting in New Mexico, through Colorado, Wyoming and Montana. (One of the big 3 trails--Complete all three for the hard-earned Triple Crown.)
7. **Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail** (2,638 miles) – The PCT begins in Mexico and travels through California, Oregon and Washington, before terminating in Canada. (One of the big 3 trails)
8. **Appalachian National Scenic Trail** (2,174 miles) – The AT is the classic long-distance hike (one of the big three hiking trails.)
9. **Buckeye Trail** (1,444 miles) – Located in Ohio, this trail started as a 20-mile hike in 1959.
10. **Florida National Scenic Trail** (1,400 miles) – Travels from south Florida to the panhandle.

Volcan Mountain Wilderness Preserve is 2,900 acres of mixed conifer forest. Hikes to the summit are 5-mile round-trip with spectacular views from desert to ocean.

Oak woodlands, native grasslands and fields of wildflowers surround Santa Ysabel Preserve, set on gently rolling hills within a 3,800-acre sanctuary. Be on the lookout for deer, coyotes and cows.

YOUTH CONFIRMATION





Their process officially began on July 9th and will conclude on October 9th, when the Right Reverend Bishop Mathes confirms these young persons during his official visit. Kathy Foxen and Mother Eleanor have been co-teaching the Youth Confirmation Classes. Please pray for the confirmands and give them support for their decision as they make their own commitment to Christ.

Confirmation is "a mature and public affirmation of faith and commitment to the responsibilities of Baptism" (BCP). At Confirmation, an individual receives the laying on of hands by the bishop, thereby affirming their own faith and visibly connecting to the broader Body of Christ.

VICAR SEARCH UPDATE

“Almighty God, giver of every good gift, look graciously on your church, and so guide the minds of those who shall choose a Priest for St. Thomas of Canterbury, that we may receive a faithful pastor, who will care for your people and equip us for our ministries; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.”

--- Book of Common Prayer, page 818

The Parish Profile Committee is working diligently and we still expect to deliver the final profile package for approval by the beginning of October. We use the term “package” because there are actually two profiles. One --- which we call “the parish profile” --- is a full color, brochure-like document that describes St. Thomas with words and pictures. Its purpose is to show candidates who we are, our ministries, governance, etc., and articulates what we’re looking for in a new vicar. This will be posted on our website for all to see, not just candidates.

The other profile --- which we call the “OTM profile” --- is a standardized, computer based profile that contains, among other things, compensation data, statistical data and a dozen essay questions about St. Thomas that will help the candidate get an even better feel of who we are. The OTM profile is maintained by the Office for Transition Ministry (hence OTM), and the information is accessible only by candidates.

We've produced the rough draft of the parish profile and are in the process of editing, and committee members are collecting information and composing responses for the rough draft of the OTM profile, for review and final draft.

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
